A big Lottery success means £350k for Citizens **Advice Broxtowe**

CITIZENS Advice Bureau in Beeston and Eastwood are ready to take on nine new staff as a result of their recent successful bid to the Big Lottery Advice Services Transition Fund.

This Partnership funding is designed to help local advice providers get together to deliver a better coordinated and more sustainable service. and CAB will be working closely with two key partners:

- Broxtowe Women's Project, who support women experiencing domestic violence, and
- · Hope Nottingham, who operate Hope Café, the 'one stop community support cafe' serving the disadvantaged and local people in need.

CAB District Manager Sue Maslowska said: "We are delighted that we have been successful in our bid, allowing us to recruit and train 30 volunteers and

help an additional 5000 clients. This new funding will all enable us to address the root causes of demand for advice and address the areas of failure."

Sue said that with the funding, they would be able to identify gaps in service provision in Broxtowe with "a view to designing future services against client need alongside a long-term aim of creating a seamless service for the community."

She added: "With demands for our service higher than ever, getting the right advice at the right time can be a lifeline for people and communities most in need. Current services are struggling to keep up with the increasing demand and greater complexity in the types of problems people are facing. Welfare reform changes are creating many challenges for our clients and this funding will enable us to provide specialist welfare benefits help for clients in Broxtowe."

The Broxtowe Women's Project Manager said: "Working in partnership with CAB and Hope Nottingham is going to be a fantastic opportunity for us - we will all be able to share our specialist knowledge to improve the way we can work with people in the local community.

"Broxtowe Women's Project is always very proactive in raising awareness of domestic violence among the local community and this gives us the chance to develop more linking up with other crucial local services. We hope the work will provide local families affected by domestic violence more options for healthier and safer lives."

Nigel Adams, Director of Hope said "Hope Nottingham is delighted to be working with Broxtowe CAB and Broxtowe Women's Project. CAB will provide provide advice training for our volunteers

as well as funding to support Hope Employment Pathway, helping long term unemployed people get into work. By learning from one another and developing joint services together we look forward to being better equipped to bring relief and empowerment to the most disadvantaged people in our community."

In the past 12 months Citizens Advice Broxtowe has helped clients with 27,000 problems on a wide range of subjects -70percent of the problems related to debt and benefit issues.

Dog has to be 'put down' after being found abandoned in woods

A RECENT distressing stray dog case for Broxtowe Borough Council officers has resulted in a decision to euthanize a dog, and once again the council is trying to bring the public's attention to the importance of responsible dog ownership.

Last week, the council's Neighbourhood Wardens were called to collect an injured Shih Tzu by a member of the public who believed it had been dumped in Strelley Village Woods. The dog, which was named Ellie by the wardens, had a bad infection and was taken to the Lawrence Veterinary Centre in Eastwood.

It is thought that Ellie may have given birth a few weeks ago, and this had caused the infection. The condition would have given Ellie a lot of pain, and the difficult decision was made to humanely euthanize her.

Ellie could have been easily treated if her owner had taken her to a vet as soon as the infection started. The council rarely has to take such drastic action and works with the local rescue kennels to re-home the hundreds of strays it picks up each year.

Cabinet Member for Environment, Cllr Richard Robinson, said: "Ellie's story highlights the importance of responsible dog ownership, especially in the run up to Christmas when new puppies are often given as presents.

"The council holds regular free or low cost microchipping events for residents as well as low cost neutering for those on qualifying benefits. So far this year 104 dogs have been microchipped for free at events in Stapleford. Nuthall and Eastwood."
